Biosolids, A Health and Environmental Issue

I've written many articles over the past year on biosolids; how septic tanks may be being blamed for our algae blooms, where cities and counties are spreading biosolids as fertilizer. We may be in luck. I'm hearing St. Lucie Representative Larry Lee, Jr. is introducing a bill this coming session to put restrictions on the application of biosolids in the Indian River Lagoon. Unfortunately, this would be a significant help to the Indian River Lagoon, as an April 2017 article by Lucas Daprile in tcpalm.com, titled, "Human waste dumped near Florida Springs," explained how Class AA isn't even tracked by Florida Department of Environmental Protection, so biosolids can be spread all around Brevard County without tracking, even though it contains phosphorus.

According to the same article, in 2007 Florida Lawmakers banded Class B waste being spread near lake Okeechobee, St. Lucie River and Caloosahatchee River Watersheds. They did this citing phosphorus pollution. The law didn't mention Class AA biosolids, so many plants began treating to the higher standards. The trouble is, according to the article, Class AA has fecal and heavy metals removed, but has the same amount of nitrogen and phosphorus as Class B biosolids.

The same article stated there are 83 sites where the Department of Environmental Protection allows landowners to dump "Class B" waste. Class B is more regulated due to fecal and heavy metal content it contains after treatment. The article shows a map of the active sites allowing Class B effluent. Two are in Brevard county, both within a couple miles of the Indian River Lagoon. Site FLA395731 (Jakubcin) is 200 acres (4890 Lloyd St., Mims), less than 4 miles from the Indian River Lagoon, and has 176.7 dry tons applied (353,400 pounds). Site FLA844462 (Port St. John Site) is 85.5 acres (Ranch Road, PSJ), less

the same amount of algae producing nitrogen and than 2 miles from the Indian River Lagoon, and has 16.335 dry tons applied (232,670 pounds).

> "Biosolids in Florida: 2013 Summary" was published in Dec., 2014. It shows there are a number of Brevard facilities applying biosolids: Cocoa Water Reclamation Facility, applying 232.24 dry tons of biosolids, Melbourne/DB Lee Waste Water Treatment Plant applying 554.2 dry tons of biosolids, Melbourne /Grant Street applying 534.9 dry tons of biosolids, Palm Bay #1 WRF, applying 937.93 dry tons of biosolids, Palm Bay #2, 937.9 dry tons of biosolids, Titusville North – Osprey, 213.3 dry tons of biosolids, West Melbourne/Ray Bullard, 256.1 dry tons of biosolids. To be fair, Titusville seems to be using wetlands and Palm Bay injects some into a deep well, although their Plan shows both Palm Bay sites as producing biosolids for off-site application, but doesn't say where they apply their biosolids. Indian River County seems to have a much higher impact to the Indian River Lagoon as it has four ranches taking in a lot of pollution. Corrigan Ranch (FLA587214) 2336 acres, having 4072 dry tons of biosolids applied. Flying L Ranch (FLA626040) 651 acres, having 1365



dry tons of biosolids applied. Ox Creek Ranch (FLA790940) 432 acres, having 1291 dry tons of biosolids applied. Pressley Ranch (FLA801097) 3059 acres, having 5744 dry tons of biosolids applied. I know this data seems old, but Biosolids in Florida: 2013 Summary is the last report the Florida Department of Environmental Protection has asked for. I hope this isn't their way of preventing citizens from finding out how much contamination we have done throughout our state.

We can't be talking from both sides of our face. Either we really want to protect the Indian River Lagoon from excessive nitrogen and phosphorus, or we just want our residents to think we are protecting the lagoon. A TC Palm Story by Lucas Daprile in February 2017, titled "Investigation: Human waste fertilizes farms, but fuels toxic algae blooms," says in 2015, Brevard County brought in 824,370 of Class AA biosolids. Remember Class AA biosolids is considered fertilizer, and can be spread anywhere, even though it contains the same nitrogen and phosphorus as the stuff being pulled from your septic tank mixed with a bit of lime. It shouldn't be very comforting. Why would we spend \$300 million plus to clean up the Indian River Lagoon when we are allowing biosolids to be dumped all around the county, so the removal accomplishes basically nothing!


I wonder what the cities and county do with their biosolids during Brevard County's summer fertilizer ban? Are they holding it until fall? What about reuse water? Do the cities shut down their systems during the summer fertilizer ban?

Please call your representatives and tell them we need to put restrictions on the application of biosolids in the Indian River Lagoon. We can't have tons of fertilizer containing nitrogen and phosphorus applied to farm land and ignore what it is doing to our Lagoon. If not submitted by Larry Lee, why not jointly by all the counties' Florida Representatives surrounding the Indian River Lagoon?

Solar Co-ops on the Rise

From the January, 2018 "The Pelican Sierra Club Florida." Sierra Club supports the move to clean, renewable energy! Many counties are forming solar co-ops, a great idea for homeowners. By going solar together as a group, the coop gets a discount through its bulk purchasing power, saving an average of 20 percent compared to the cost of an individual installation. The group uses a competitive bidding process and selects a single company chosen by the co-op to install systems on members' homes. If you own a home in one of these counties, or would like to start one in your area, check out http://www.solarunitedneighbors.org/florida (formerly FLSUN.org). Counties with co-ops: St. Johns, Hillsborough North Pinellas, Volusia, Miami-Dade, Sarasota, East/West Broward, Alachua and Seminole.

Brevard had one in 2016, and after those deciding to install, the co-op was disbanded. I'm sure if enough people are interested, we can start another in Brevard. Something to think about. **Port St. John Seniors**

I have been asked for information on the Titusville Mall. Straight from the City of Titusville's "Talking Points":

Development continues to move with lightning speed at Titus Landing as construction crews raise walls and add roofs to the buildings of Phase 2. Elsewhere, four new stores are slated to open by the end of October, including: Wayback Burgers, Firehouse Subs, E-Smoker, and Titus Nail and Spa.

Julie Hodgdon, Marketing Associate for AG Development Group, Inc. — the developers of Titus Landing — says that due to Hurricane Irma, the completion of Epic Theaters is slightly de-

layed, pushing the expected opening to January, 2018. Meanwhile, buildout permits have been issued and work continues for Rackroom Shoes and Coldwell Banker, with expected opening dates fast approaching. The buildings for Beall's and Ulta Cosmetics are expected to be done in February, 2018, with interior buildout being completed concurrently.

The developers continue to pursue even more stores and restaurants for the project. Currently, they are actively speaking with smaller clothing stores and two big, national chain restaurants to come to Titusville. For the 23rd straight year, no taxes will be assessed to support operations of the North Brevard County Hospital District d/b/a Parrish Medical Center (PMC). PMC is a public community hospital, and state law gives the North Brevard Hospital District (d/b/a Parrish Medical Center) the authority to set a tax rate to support hospital operations. Monthly Tax Update

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has reminded employers and other businesses of the Jan. 31st filing deadline that now applies to filing wage statements (W-2's) and independent contractor forms (1099-Misc's) with the government. These forms need to be filed with the Social Security Administration and mailed to the recipients by January 31st. This deadline makes it easier for the IRS to verify income individuals report on their tax returns and helps prevent fraud. Failure to file these forms correctly and timely may result in penalties. In the past, these penalties have not been issued, but this is changing. One of our clients have been penalized over \$3,000 for being one day late.

You are also urged to take advantage of the accuracy, speed and convenience of filing these forms electronically the day before they are due. You should start at the beginning of December to verify current and terminated employees' information. This includes names, addresses, Social Security or individual taxpayer identification numbers. Also, be sure to verify your own information is correct and active with the Social Security Administration before January.

Don't forget, if paper Forms W-2 are going to be used, then you should order early. If you think an extension of time may be needed to file, it's no longer automatic. The IRS will only grant extensions for very specific reasons. You need to review Form 8809 for more details.

2018. However, I don't see any sense in telling at your earliest convenience or contact your tax you about information subject to change, and I think it's going to change. So, I am simply going tell you to pay attention to the news and see what Society of Accountants. new tax bill decisions are. I will update you in the January, 2018, tax update.

It appears personal exemptions are going away, standard deductions are going to almost double, head of household filing status may be going away, child tax credit may be going to \$1,600, Affordable Care Health insurance penalty is being removed and multiple other changes are being considered. This location houses a production and distribution brewery, full kitchen, outdoor beer garden seating and indoor seating, community style or at the bar.

I have to admit, I'm not much of a craft beer fan. I'm basically a domestic light beer lover, so when I found out that the Brix doesn't even serve domestic beers, I was apprehensive on giving them a try. So when my wife said her work group was meeting there after work, I thought this would be a good opportunity to check this place out. Besides, I've heard the food is very good.

We arrived around 4 pm on a Friday and the place was already near full capacity and parking was limited. I noticed about an hour later, people were waiting for an open table and the parking lot was full, with people parking along US1. I highly recommend arriving between 4-5 pm on a Friday or Saturday night.

As soon as I walked in, I was impressed. Whoever they hired to makeover this former lumberyard did an excellent job. They managed to capture the nostalgic old Florida appeal with an up to date modern flair. Supposedly, the tables, chairs, lighting, taps and signage are all locally made. Even the bathrooms have a unique touch you'll have to see for yourself.

The wait staff was very attentive. As soon as we were all seated, our waitress took our drink orders and was very patient and knowledgeable about the many different beers they serve. I mentioned that I preferred a beer on the lighter side and she recommended a couple. I choose the "Oskar Blues Mama's Yella Pils," which was described as; "Rich aromas of bread, barley with hints of caramel". As I stated earlier, I'm not much of a craft beer fan, but I actually liked this beer. In fact, it tasted just like a beer I was drinking in Ireland a few weeks earlier called "Hop House 13."

After a couple of beers we decided to order some appetizers. We got the Fresh Pork Rinds and the Irish Nachos (large, sharable serving). The Pork Rinds were ok, but the Irish Nachos were superb. They're House kettle chips loaded with a beer cheese blend, jalapenos, bacon, green onions and sour cream. The plate was easily sharable with 6 people and only \$10.

For dinner, I ordered the "Plain Ol' Cheesy." It's basically a traditional cheeseburger with lettuce, tomato & onion. The burger appeared to be homemade, was cooked perfectly, large enough and served on a pretzel bun. Very good.

If you haven't been to the Brix Project yet, I highly recommend it. Not only does the place have an aesthetic appeal, the beer, food and service is way above average.
