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#### Good Day! by Maureen Rupe Port St. John Fay Blvd Rezoning Request

A rezoning request came before the Port St. John Planning & Zoning Board on August 8th. The request was for a 1.78 acre parcel to be rezoned from Industrial – Low Intensity/Residential 4 to BU-1 on property between Fay Blvd. and Balfern Street. The property is owned by the Christian Alliance Church on Fay Blvd. There is an intended General Dollar Store to be built on the property, which means two within a short distance of each other. The rezone was unanimously recommended to be denied by the PSJ P&Z board.

Reasoning: The property is adjacent to residential properties on the north and south east side, and Challenger 7 Elementary to the south. There is another similar store a very short distance from this property, and there was concern of additional traffic for kids walking to or from school. There wasn't a good reception for more intense business use for a Dollar Store in this location from the Planning & Zoning Board.

This still must come before the County Commission. The residents around this rezoning are

planning to attend. The applicant for Christian Missionary Alliance, S.E. District has requested an automatic tabling from the August 20th LPA meeting (for the small-scale amendment), but both the small-scale amendment and rezoning requests will be at 5 pm on October 4th at the County Commission Chambers, Government Building C, in Viera. The Commission will make the final decision.

#### Willow Creek

I wrote about Willow Creek months ago; a development about ½ mile north of Port St. John on Grissom Pkwy. (where all the 18-wheelers park). There's a picture in the July, 2018 edition of Titusville Talking Points, www.titusville.com/talkingpoints, but it is really hard to read, so I didn't add it, but did add the words in the article: "A sketch plat has been approved for a 70-lot single-family home subdivision located west of Grissom Parkway, south of Shepard Drive. The next step in the process is the submittal of the Preliminary Plat/Engineering Plans.

## Titusville Sewage Spill vs. Nutrient Removal Grants

Florida Today reported on July 31, 2018, the

Titusville Osprey Water Treatment Plant spilt an estimated 870,000 gallons of raw sewage into the Indian River Lagoon from an improperly abandoned pipe that was supposed to be inactive 40 years ago. There's no telling how much that cost residents of Brevard when, using words from Titusville, "The Lagoon is in danger.... The decline of the lagoon can potentially endanger the local economy and negatively impact the quality of life for the community. The City of Titusville Handout titled, "Restoring the Indian River Lagoon, The City of Titusville's Efforts to Save the Lagoon," talked about receiving "\$8,000,000 in grants from Brevard County Save the Lagoon Fund."

These are funds from the self-imposed tax to save the Indian River Lagoon. The funds are to remove nutrients from their reclaimed water down to a level that can be absorbed by lawns and grasses. It stated the reclaimed water they produce now is more than can be absorbed, and it goes into the ground water where it flows to the lagoon and encourages algal blooms.

Not only that, four days after spilling nearly a million gallon of raw sewage into the Indian



River Lagoon, they declared everything was satisfactory. How did they determine this?

#### The Brevard taxpayers deserve better than this.

And isn't there reclaimed water throughout the county? Are all reclaimed waters above nutrient level to absorb by lawns and grasses? This can also be said concerning all the bio-solids put out from all the sewage plants along the Indian River Lagoon. They spread AA bio-solids and do not track the amount that is spread, as it is called fertilizer, and I'm sure they don't stop during the summer months like they tell us residents to stop.

I'm sure the cities are following state law, but nitrogen/phosphorus fertilizer is supposed to be banned throughout the summer months. The cities and county need to be told they aren't above their own laws. If what Titusville is saying is true, the winter months are as much of a concern if we have more nitrogen and phosphorus running through the ground water into the Indian River Lagoon, and for that matter, the Saint Johns River. Is it not showing the same symptoms due to the increased water flow? See in my article, "Florida's Polluted Water." We are

close to ruining all the water in Florida. What will our property be worth living next to a continuous giant sewer throughout the state?

#### Florida's Polluted Water

I know everyone has seen and heard the issues we have with pollution in the Indian River Lagoon, but the entire state has been moving in this direction for a very long time. I read in a 06/20/18 opinion by Robert Kennedy titled, "Florida's water laws have not been enforced." It described the remarkable characteristics of Florida when he said, "Originally blessed with more than 1,200 miles of coastal shorelines, 20 million acres of freshwater wetlands, 7,700 lakes, 11,000 miles of streams, and at least 1,100 artesian springs and their spring runs, the geography of Florida is about water." Robert Knight serves on the executive committee of the Florida Springs Council. His description sounds so amazing and I cannot understand how we have mistreated this

blessed place where we live. The editorial was overly concerned on the way Florida relies on Best Practices to protect our waters.

Robert Knight states, "But now in 2018 it is painfully evident that Florida's water laws have not been enforced. FDEP reports that nearly 27,000 water body segments are not meeting standards. Red tide is killing fish and manatees off both coasts; guacamole-thick algal blooms are wreaking South Florida's natural resources economy; the Everglades, Florida Bay and the Florida Keys continue to be polluted by nutrient runoff; and thousands of Florida lakes, rivers and springs are officially impaired by excessive nutrient concentrations.

While water pollution results in great ecological and economic harm affecting everyone, the Florida Legislature, with the power to stop the downhill slide, is more responsive to the voices of agriculture and urban development than to concerned citizens. Fish and wildlife suffer the most, with declining populations due to loss of habitat."

of Environmental Protection (FDEP or DEP) adoption of Basin Management Action Plans (BMAP) for 24 of the largest springs that rely on Agriculture to use Best Practices to protect these springs to reduce nitrate nitrogen concentrations. It stated as an example Santa Fe Springs BMAP, which did the same, showed no reduction using these "Best Practices." The Florida Springs Council recommended "curtailing fertilizer use in vulnerable karst areas by 80 to 90 percent." The editorial stated currently there are more than 1 billion pounds of nitrogen-containing fertilizer used per year in Florida's spring areas.

Ocala.com did a 07/31/18 editorial saying the same thing. Three years ago, DEP had set goals to reduce nitrate and these Basin Management Plans are being challenged by a dozen individuals and groups around the state. Some of challengers are from the Florida Homebuilders Association that says it's going to cost too much to install nitrogen-reducing septic systems that cost more. On the other hand, environmentalists are saying the BMAP doesn't go far enough, since these Agriculture Best Practices haven't reduced our

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water's contamination at all, let alone these arpower. We got a 5-kilowatt Solar System in Febbitrary percentage levels.

Ocala.com stated DEP has put BMAPs on hold, but DEP says it is only tweaking the BMAPs without seriously addressing nitrate pollution or enforcing rules on yard fertilizer, septic tanks or agriculture runoff. Our waters will continue to be imperiled and tainted.

Our economy, our health and our quality of life now depend on what each of us do to save Florida.

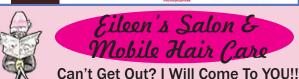
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#### Combined Viera High and Space Coast Jr/Sr High FCCLA Members Attended National Leadership Conference

#### **Monthly Tax Update**

Now is the time to fund your Individual Retirement Arrangement (IRA) and that could lead to questions. Here are a few IRS tax tips about saving for retirement using your IRA.

First, if you participate, or may be permitted to participate, in an employer retirement qualified plan, your understanding of the Adjusted Gross Income limits is required. If your spouse is permitted to participate, or may be permitted to participate, in an employer retirement qualified plan, then there is another set of Adjusted Gross Income limits applicable and your understanding of these limits are required.

Okay, next, your age comes into play. You must be under the age of 70½ at the end of the tax year to permit you to contribute to a traditional IRA and there is no age limit for the Roth IRA.

You must have taxable earned wages to contribute to an IRA. This includes income from wages, salaries or net self-employment income. It also includes tips, commissions, bonuses and alimony. If you are married and file a joint tax return, only one spouse needs to have compensation in most cases.

The timing of your contribution is also important. You can contribute to an IRA at any time during the year. To count for 2018, you must contribute by the due date of your tax return. This does not include extensions. That means most people must contribute by April 15, 2019. If you contribute between Jan. 1 and April 15, make sure your plan sponsor applies it to the year you choose (2018 or 2019). There are also contribution limits. The most you can contribute to your IRA (Roth or Traditional) for 2018 is the smaller of your taxable earned wages or net self-employment income for the year or \$5,500. If your age will be 50 or older at the end of 2018,



then the maximum you can contribute increases to \$6,500 or earned wages or self-employment net income. The \$5,500 or \$6,500 is the maximum contribution allowed to your Roth, or your Traditional, or if you contribute to both, added together. If you contribute more than these limits, an additional tax will apply. The additional tax is 6 percent of the excess amount you contributed over the permitted amount, unless you recharacterize the contribution before April 15, 2019.

Let's change gears now to repealed deduction you can no longer claim on your 2018 tax return, unless Congress changes the laws again.

  1) No longer are personal exemptions deductible for yourself, your spouse or any dependent.

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# Bones and Joints

Here's what you need to know to build and maintain these important body parts for life

hey're a marvel of divine engineering. Your bones

make up only about 15 percent of your total weight, but they're strong enough to support your entire body. Given the role your bones and joints play in keeping you mobile, caring for them is critical. By knowing how the body changes throughout life, possible red flags and healthy strategies, you'll be able to maintain strong bones and joints well into those golden years.



#### The Teens

- ▶ On the inside: Throughout the teen years, new bone tissue is added faster than existing bone is absorbed. As a result, bones become larger and heavier (until about age 30, when a person reaches peak bone mass).
- ▶ Watch out: As a teen, you really have to build a strong skeleton. Because of this, teenagers need to focus on healthy eating and drinking habits. While calcium is essential for strong bones, only 14 percent of girls and 36 percent of boys get the recommended 1,300 milligrams of calcium daily, according to the USDA. Compounding that problem, today's teens drink twice as much soda as dairy or calcium-fortified beverages.
- ▶ Healthy advice: To build bone mass and joint strength at a young age, children should be active. Teenagers should embrace activity every day—in the right way. That means sedentary children should get moving, and the ones who are overactive may need more balance.

#### Your 20s and 30s

▶ On the inside: From childhood into your 20s, your bones continue to grow as new bone tissue formation outweighs bone loss. By your late 20s, your bones are as strong

- and thick as they will ever be. Build as much bone as possible now and you'll lower your chances of osteoporosis. That's because after age 30, both men and women begin to lose a small amount of bone mass each year.
- ➤ Watch out: A risk of arthritis increases.
  The most common type of arthritis is osteoarthritis, which affects an estimated 31 million Americans. Arthritis is the nation's No. 1 cause of disability.
- healthy advice: Exercise is the closest thing to a fountain of youth that we have. There are so many tremendous benefits for your body. It doesn't have to be planned exercise in the gym. Just getting moving is important. Eating right is also essential. According to a report in the Journal of the American College of Nutrition, dietary protein is a key nutrient for bone health.

#### Your 40s

▶ On the inside: Your body's soft tissues, such as ligaments, are made of collagen. With age, the collagen fibers can dramatically change. Additionally, during perimenopause, bone density changes, and women typically lose more bone mass than they build. That's because estrogen production declines during this period.

- ► Watch out: A lot of adults experience common "tight" joint spots, including around the hamstrings, lower back, calves and front o shoulders. So, that hobbling you experience right out of bed in the morning may be a warning sign: Get more calcium and vitamin k
- ► Healthy advice: With age, you need to spend more time working on flexibility, so start a good daily stretching program.

  Regular exercise keeps your body young.

  Motion is lotion. Weight-bearing exercise is also key at this life stage to stimulate bone and muscle growth.

#### Your 50s and beyond

- ▶ On the inside: During this decade, bone mass and density are lost more rapidly. That, and the fact that bones lose calcium and other minerals, may cause bones to break more easily. Joints will become stiffer and less flexible, and fluid in the joints may decrease, causing cartilage to rub together and begin to erode. Calcification (aka mineral deposits) may also build up in joints.
- ▶ *Watch out:* Osteoporosis and osteoarthritis are common problems for older women. Inflammation, pain, stiffness and deformity may result from a breakdown of the joint structures.
- ► Healthy advice: Amp up on nutritious foods. Avoid processed foods high in sugar and fat. Enjoy foods high in antioxidants such as blueberries and green tea. Lycopene—derived from tomatoes in sauces and the fruit itself—also shows promise in fighting osteoporosis. And hit the weights. Progressive resistance training has a direct, positive effection bone density.

It finally happened that in the United States we do such a poor job of recycling that China, where we sent everything we couldn't Also, we would like to extend a huge Thank make a buck on, put their foot down and said "no more" - they stopped taking our trash and recyclables. Now this country is left wondering where in the world (literally) we're going to get rid of it all.

> Several years ago I asked the County Commissioners why recycling wasn't mandatory in Brevard County and they said that it was because it cost too much money and they didn't have the staff to enforce it. Well, now it's looking a little different. It's going to cost us a lot more money to dispose of our trash and recycling.

> I noticed when I looked at the Waste Management website which referred you to "recycle often, recycle right" (https://recycleoftenrecycleright.com/resources/for-home/) that glass is no longer being accepted by Waste Management from schools. I suspect that's because they have new contracts with the schools and that this will also be the case when municipalities execute new contracts with them. And, I also suspect that this has to do with the all powerful dollar. This will be a huge problem for us all. As the markets for recyclables dry up there's no money to be made and if there's no money to be made, companies will have no reason to accept recyclables.

> So here we sit, the residents, the customers, need I say, the taxpayers.....Many of us recycle according to the rules but I think many more don't. I think the time has come for the County to make recycling mandatory. Reading the article which started all of this shows just how much money it's costing because people don't recycle correctly.

> I'm not one to encourage regulating every action, but the fact here, as I see it, is that because there are folks who don't recycle correctly, or, for that matter, don't recycle at all, it's becoming a very costly proposition for municipalities, not to mention what it's doing to the environment. Life looks a lot different this summer but the key word is LIFE! We cannot thank our trainer Joe, Who We Play For, the donors and our school enough!"

Joe went above and beyond to provide a truly healing experience for a young man and his family.
