Joe Biden Is Sworn In As President

Joe Biden is now the 46th president of the United States. On Wednesday he took the oath of office as President of the United States. Biden made history with his pick of Sen. Kamala Harris as his No. 2. Harris is now the first woman to hold the office of vice president.

The biggest challenge facing Biden as he takes office is the COVID-19 pandemic, which has already claimed the lives of more than 400,000 Americans. Biden has said his top priority will be vaccinating Americans against the deadly virus. The goal is to ad-

minister 100 million COVID-19 vaccine doses in his first 100 days in office. With current vaccines requiring two shots, that would cover 50 million Americans. Last Friday he said he will activate the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the National Guard to help get vaccines to millions of Americans.

The pandemic has pushed technology issues, including net neutrality, rural broadband and online privacy, to the sideline. But the violence at the Capitol has many lawmakers looking at ways to rein in the tech giants. They are troubled by the rampant flow of hate speech and disinformation, as well as interference by foreign countries in the election. Both sides say

Governor Announces Residency Requirement for COVID-19 Vaccinations

Florida Governor Ron DeSantis has announced that all COVID-19 vaccines dispensed in Florida should be available specifically for eligible Florida residents.

In Brevard County, appointments are required for vaccination, and those currently eligible for the vaccine are Florida residents age 65 and older, and healthcare workers with direct patient contact.

Effective immediately individuals receiving a COVID-19 vaccine must bring:

All clients must provide identification

Healthcare workers must provide proof of employment in addition to ID (examples: work ID badge, paystub, etc.)

Individuals with an out-of-state ID should also provide proof of residency or semipermanent residency (examples: utility bill, property tax receipt, lease agreement for Florida property, etc.)

Any out-of-state client who has received vac-

cine at the Florida Department of Health-Brevard in Viera site prior to January 19, 2021, will have their second dose appointment honored.

Please do not visit a vaccine site without an appointment.

Good Day! by Maureen Rupe Port St. John Fire Station Move?

One of the recommendations of the Port St. John Small Area Study was to move the fire station currently on Carole Ave. closer to Grissom, but still on Fay Blvd. I wasn't at the meeting where the move was recommended and asked whether the recommendation was based on the Verona Development north of Port St John. I was told it was just a recommendation and studies would have to be done. With the increase of residents and developments in Titusville and Brevard County, it seems the county needs to add fire stations, not just move the ones we have now. Even if they have county property where the fire station can be moved, it takes a significant amount of money to move existing facilities rather than to build a new fire station.

If you look at the map attached showing the various fire stations in North Brevard, there are three recommended locations to move our PSJ fire station: 1) to an area near Fay & Adams Place just north of Challenger Elementary; 2) at the northeast corner of Fay/Grissom; and 3) along U.S. 1 near Fay Blvd. Do any of these make

sense, especially moving it to U.S. 1 where it's even further away from Titusville's large number of housing developments and across the railroad tracks from most of Port St. John?

There is a significant distance between Fire Station 24 on SR405 just east of Walmart, and Fire Station 26 in Port St John. But if you look at the distance between Fire Station 26 and Four Communities and Fire Station 29, moving the PSJ fire station isn't going to help the massive number of homes Titusville is building in Verona, and especially all the new developments Titusville has been building north of SR405. If you are going to move Brevard County assets, it would be more productive to move Fire Station 24 (the fire station you pass on the way to Walmart). Move that station east to around Grissom Blvd. or around Sisson Blvd. on SR405. It doesn't seem cost effective to move PSJ's fire station a half mile to the west, as this move isn't going to make much of an impact except for costing a lot of money to have traffic come to a stop every time the fire trucks leave or come back to the station.

age loads of properties are just as bad or worse. Many sewer plants around the state have been built and left, thinking no maintenance is ever required. Then when they spill thousands of gallons of urine and feces out either on the land or, in Brevard County's case, it's usually into the Indian River Lagoon.

If not spilling the raw or partially treated sewer, they just take out the pathogens and other bacteria and then either use it for fertilizer in liquid form close to the sewage plant or dried so it can be transported as biosolids.

Titusville has been given a lot of money from our Save Our Indian River Lagoon ½ cent sales tax. Recently, (and not the first time), Titusville spilled an unknown quantity of raw sewage, and they don't even know when the spill started. See the timeline of events below:

Dec 15: Nearby residents complained of sewage smells from the two ponds around Sand Point Park.

Dec 16: There was a massive fish kill in both ponds.

Dec 19-20: There were no signs posted in the area around the Titusville Lights of Hope Festival Party and Snow Days during this major spill of more than 100,000 gallons into the two ponds.


Dec 23: They did not post any visible signs around the west pond until 8 days later.

Dec 24: They did not post any visible signs around the east pond until 9 days later.

Dec. 24: Titusville finally stopped the sewage and dead fish polluted water in the east pond from flowing into the IRL. This was 9 days after the spill started.

On January 9th, I attended a very peaceful protest against the Titusville sewage spill. It

"It's the death by a thousand cuts," said Bob Knight, an environmental scientist with the Howard T. Odum Florida Springs Institute, who has studied Florida's waters for 40 years. "The lagoon's woes threaten the region's \$2.5 billion recreation, fishing and tourism economy, alarming kayak tour operators, charter boat captains, restaurateurs and organizers of bird-watching festivals.

Environmentalists are distressed to see the lagoon's rich variety of life threatened in a crisis similar to what has happened in recent decades in such places as the Chesapeake Bay, Lake Erie and the Gulf of Mexico.

Although the federal and state governments have spent hundreds of millions of dollars to heal the lagoon in recent years, an Associated Press examination found that pollution spiked, algae blooms spread and fish kills worsened over the past decade and a half as central Florida's population swelled faster than that of anywhere else in the state. Water quality data analyzed by the AP showed that the average level of phosphorous — a byproduct of fertilizers and human waste that algae thrive on — rose nearly 75 percent between 2000 and 2016. Average chlorophyll readings, used to measure the presence of algae, almost tripled.

Home to more than 2,900 species of plants, birds and fish, the waterway has been polluted since the mid-20th century by fertilizer

World's Smallest Pacemaker

Parrish Medical Center offers the world's smallest pacemaker, which can now treat Atrioventricular (AV) Block. Parrish is one of the first hospitals in the state of Florida to offer MicraTM AV, the world's smallest pacemaker with atrioventricular (AV) synchrony. This new device, indicated for the treatment of patients with AV block, extends the most advanced pacing technology – at one-tenth the size of a traditional pacemaker – to more patients than ever before.

The first procedure was performed by Interventional Cardiologist Rene Celis, MD, on December 19, 2019 and since then 18 have been performed at Parrish Medical Center.

AV block is a type of heart block in which the electrical signals between the chambers of the heart (the atria and the ventricles) are impaired. Pacemakers, the most common way to treat AV block, help restore the heart's normal rhythm and relieve symptoms by coordinating the electrical activity of the atria and the ventricles. When this process – known as AV synchrony – is achieved,

Monthly Tax Update

We're all ready to get our taxes filed and hopefully have a refund. Because of recent legislation, the first filing date for the 2021 tax season will start on Friday, February 12, 2021. This is when the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) will begin accepting and processing 2020 tax year returns.

This later start date allows the IRS time to do additional programming and testing of IRS systems following the December 27, 2020, tax law changes providing a second round of Economic Impact Payments and other benefits. The additional programming work is critical to ensure IRS systems run smoothly. These changes ensure eligible people will receive any remaining stimulus money, as a Recovery Rebate Credit, when they file their 2020 tax return.

Additionally, IRS Free File launched this week, giving individuals an early opportunity to claim credits like the Recovery Rebate Credit and other deductions. Leading tax software providers make their online products available for free as part of a 19-year partnership with the IRS, which includes nine products in English and two in Spanish. You will be permitted to file, but it won't process until February 12, 2021.

On another note, the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) is a financial boost for families with low- or moderate- incomes. EITC can lower a taxpayer's taxes, and even result in a refund. The amount of EITC varies based on income, filing status and family size. This year, you may elect to use your 2019 or your 2020 earned income for the most EITC possible.

As a reminder, to qualify, you must have earned income and adjusted gross income within certain limits and meet certain basic rules.

Let's talk about your Stimulus Payment now. You can check the Get My Payment tool on IRS. gov where it will show a date your payment was mailed or what the status is. If a payment is reflected, you should watch the mail for either a paper check or debit card.

The debit cards arrive in a white envelope that prominently displays the U.S. Department of the Treasury seal. The Treasury Department and the IRS are issuing millions of second Economic Impact Payments by prepaid debit card to speed delivery of the payments to as many people as possible. The prepaid debit card, called

the Economic Impact Payment card, is issued by Treasury's financial agent, MetaBank®, N.A. The IRS does not determine who receives a card.

The form of payment for the second mailed EIP may be different than the first mailed EIP. Some people who received a paper check last time might receive a prepaid debit card this time, and some people who received a prepaid debit card last time may receive a paper check.

Finally, be sure to check out your tax preparer's credentials if you're looking for assistance in filing your taxes. Remember, you are still responsible for any errors on your return.

Economic Impact Payment Scams

The IRS began distribution of the Economic Impact payments, which means new scams are popping up to try to steal your money. Be aware of the following tactics scammers use to ensure your payment arrives safely.

Economic Impact Payment Scams

1.) Verify information via phone, email, or text.

The IRS will NOT call, text or email to verify or ask you to provide financial information. Use the IRS website to submit all information.

2.) Phishing Emails Providing Specific Information

DO NOT click on any attachments claiming to include economic impact payment information. These attachments can contain malware that will download onto your computer and steal your information.

3.) Pre-Payment

The IRS WILL NOT ask you to pay any amount of money to receive your economic impact payment.

4.) Receive Your Payment Faster

There is no way to receive your economic impact payment faster. If someone calls claiming they can send yours faster if you pay them a small amount via gift cards or pre-paid debit cards, you'll know it's a scam.

5.) Fake Checks

If you receive a check in the mail for an amount other than the amount you're supposed to receive, this is a scam. Correspondence with the check may ask you to call a number and verify your information to receive payment, DO NOT CALL! Report this to the Federal Trade Commission.

6.) The Official Name

The official name for these checks is economic impact payments. This is the wording that is used on all government payment and used in all government communication.

It's very unlikely that IRS will call you. If you receive communication from the "government" that uses the words stimulus check or stimulus payment, then it's not the government and you should hang up.

President Biden Goes Right to V

President Biden hit the ground running on his first day in office. Biden signed 15 executive orders and two agency actions on Wednesday evening. The new president's actions were aimed at reversing several of former President Donald Trump's policies, including the pandemic response, the environment, anti-immigration policies, diversity and economic recovery. "There's no time to start like today," Biden told reporters in the Oval Office. Here are Biden's executive actions from his first day:

- An executive order requiring that people wear masks and maintain social distancing on federal property.
- The launch of a "100 Days Masking Challenge" to encourage Americans to wear masks.
- The reversal of Trump's decision to remove the U.S. from the World Health Organization. Anthony Fauci, the nation's top infectious disease expert, will lead the American delegation.
- An executive order that creates the position of COVID-19 response coordinator and restores the Directorate for Global Health Security and Biodefense, a team in charge of the pandemic response, within the National Security Council.
- An executive order to extend eviction and foreclosure moratoriums. The moratorium for evictions will be extended until at least March 31.
- Extended the existing pause on student loan payments and interest for Americans with federal student loans until at least Sept. 30.
- An "instrument" that will allow the U.S. to rejoin the Paris Agreement on climate change within 30 days. The executive order fulfilled a campaign promise.
- An executive order with the aim of "embedding equity across federal policymaking and rooting out systemic racism and other barriers to opportunity from federal programs and institutions." This order will also disband the 1776 Commission, which released a report on Monday that historians said distorted the role of slavery in the U.S.
- An executive order reversing an order that excluded undocumented immigrants from the Census. The order now requires non-citizens to be included in the Census and the apportionment of congressional representatives.

The new year usually ushers in a bevy of resolutions and new starts, but this year I'm praying for a return to something akin to our old normal. I'm inviting you all to join me in thanking The Big Guy for all the good in the world, beginning with the vaccine and continuing to the kindness we need to look for every day.

Living just down the road from Cocoa Village, most of us just wander around a few streets when there's an art show, but my recent visit revealed many wonderful little side streets and a hodge podge of historical buildings very few people know exist. 11 Things to Know About the U.S. COVID-19 Vaccination P

Now that there are authorized and recommended vaccines to prevent COVID-19 in the United States, here are 8 things you need to know about the new COVID-19 Vaccination Program and COVID-19 vaccines.

Do I need a doctor's note to receive the vaccine if I have a pre-existing medical condition?

No.

Are there specific allergy concerns related to the Moderna vaccine?

As of now, the FDA and CDC have not released specific information about contraindications to the Moderna vaccine. The CDC does not disqualify people with a history of allergies to food, medications, pollen, stings, or other substances from getting the vaccine. If you have a history of allergies to specific foods or medications, you should discuss the risks and benefits of the vaccine with your health care provider. Based on your risk factors for developing severe disease if you contract COVID-19, you and your provider can decide whether you should take the vaccine now or wait a little longer. The FDA has noted two populations who should not receive the vaccine:

- · Those who have had a severe allergic reaction after a previous dose of this vaccine
- · Those who have had a severe allergic reaction to any ingredient of this vaccine

Should I get the vaccine if have a bleeding disorder or am taking a prescription blood thinner (i.e. Eliquis, Xarelto, Warfarin, Plavix)?

You can still receive the vaccine if you have a bleeding disorder or are taking a blood thinner. It does not exclude you from receiving the vaccine. The vaccine is not associated with serious bleeding risk. It is possible that you experience light bruising and/or light bleeding at the injection site which is a common side effect with any vaccine and generally resolves the same day.

The safety of COVID-19 vaccines is a top priority.

The U.S. vaccine safety system ensures that all vaccines are as safe as possible.

CDC has developed a new tool, v-safe, as an additional layer of safety monitoring to increase our ability to rapidly detect any safety issues with COVID-19 vaccines. V-safe is a new smartphone-based, after-vaccination health checker for people who receive the vaccines.

COVID-19 vaccination will help protect you from getting COVID-19. Two doses are needed.

Depending on the specific vaccine you get, a second shot 3-4 weeks after your first shot is needed to get the most protection the vaccine has to offer against this serious disease. CDC is making recommendations for who should be offered COVID-19 vaccine first when supplies are limited.

To help guide decisions about how to distribute limited initial supplies of COVID-19 vaccine, CDC and the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices have published recommendations for which groups should be vaccinated first.

There is currently a limited supply of CO-VID-19 vaccine in the United States, but supply will increase in the weeks and months to come.

The goal is for everyone to be able to easily get vaccinated against COVID-19 as soon as large enough quantities are available. Once vaccine is widely available, the plan is to have several thousand vaccination providers offering COVID-19 vaccines in doctors' offices, retail pharmacies, hospitals, and federally qualified health centers.

Designing a Beautiful Garden for You and

You don't need a prairie or large lot to attract and support pollinators. A meadow or informal, formal and even container gardens can bring in bees, butterflies and hummingbirds to help pollinate plants. It's just a matter of selecting the right plants, adjusting your maintenance practices, and skipping the pesticides.

Create your garden by converting a few square feet of lawn, garden bed or front yard into a pollinator-friendly garden. You may want to start by switching out part of an existing garden or container to more pollinator-friendly flowers.

Expand your planting options by converting a portion of your lawn into a pollinator garden. Outline the bed with a hose or rope. Remove the sod, add compost as needed to improve drainage and you'll be ready to plant.

You can build your own or simplify and dress up your efforts by using an easy-to-assemble raised garden kit like the Pollinator Garden Bed (gardeners.com). Its long-lasting cedar planks slide into aluminum corners to create a hexagonal bed. Get creative while increasing the garden's size by adding additional sections to create a honeycomb or other interesting design.

Mark the outline of the raised bed you select. Cut the grass short and cover with newspaper. Set your raised bed in place and fill with a quality planting mix. Mulch four to six inches surrounding the raised bed for ease of mowing and to eliminate the need to hand trim.

Once your planting bed is prepared, you're ready to plant. Include single daisy-like black-eyed Susans, coneflowers, and asters that allow visiting insects to rest and warm when sipping on nectar or dining on pollen. Add a few tubular flowers for butterflies and hummingbirds. They both like bright colors and can be seen visiting salvias, penstemon and nasturtiums. And don't forget the bees that are attracted to bright white, yellow, blue and ultraviolet colors. You'll find

There are many restaurants in our area that serve

breakfast; some good, some bad and most, it's hit or miss depending on when you go. Some places I've had a great breakfast only to return at a later date and have a horrible breakfast. It doesn't seem to matter what day of the week or what time of day you go. Like I said, it's hit or miss.

While running some errands on Merritt Island early one day after Christmas, my wife and I decided to try the Causeway Diner for breakfast. The Causeway Diner is located on Rt. 3 (Courtenay Pkwy.) in north Merritt Island. We had a fantastic experience. The staff is attentive, our food was cooked perfectly, the wait time for our food was minimal, portions were above average and their prices are very reasonable.

I ordered what I call the standard breakfast; 2 eggs over medium, home fries, bacon and toast. My wife ordered the Athenian Omelet, which is made with spinach and Feta cheese, and she also got the home fries and toast. Everything we got was cooked to perfection. My eggs and her omelet were neither undercooked nor overcooked, they were just right. The home fries appear to be fresh potatoes, chopped up and fried nice and crispy; no soggy home fries here. Even the bacon was cooked right; not flimsy, but not overcooked either.

I've been back 3 times for breakfast and every time it was consistently good. So, I do recommend the Causeway Diner for breakfast if you're in the area. They're also open for lunch and dinner and serve a huge variety of foods such as seafood, sandwiches, burgers, salads, etc. According to their menu; if there something you like that's not on the menu, just ask, they may even make it just for you.


